# Dear friends,

In my note for the October Pauline, I was expecting surgery to take place in February of this year. Given the state of waiting lists for this and other surgeries at the time, I was surprised at such an early procedure. I could not be more thankful that instead of still waiting, I am already 6 weeks post-op and, after a positive consultation on 21st Jan, ready to start physiotherapy. I will be working with the URC's Occupational Health team in the coming weeks, to discuss a careful phased-return to work.

There is an obvious but little spoken truth that everyone who faces ill-health and disability, does so in their own way – and that must be OK. Giving dignity and acceptance of an individual's way of being during such intense periods, is a gift beyond words. I want to say more than a simple 'thank you', for allowing me the gift of coping in the way that enabled me to get through and face one of the hardest times of my life.

This 'bearing with one another in love', as Paul puts it in Ephesians 4: 1-3, is a gift beyond words. Remember how you have felt in a moment of knowing you are valued.

As a church family we are called to bear with one another, which we know can be a struggle! If we follow Jesus, we are also called to bear with one another as a global community – to give each other the gift of knowing we are valued, because we are of God.

I look forward, in real joy, to being back with you, as we share this journey of loving with each other and with the world.

May we know God's blessing as creator of incredible diversity, in the way of Jesus the healer, and through the power and compassion of the Spirit.

## Shoebox update

When looking at exactly what went on to make this project a success - we realized it was a big operation needing detailed planning - Helen Dean and I have taken on the organisation of the Shoebox Appeal - but we need your help - all of you! It's a lot of work, in the past hundreds of shoeboxes have been covered, products sourced, etc largely all unnoticed - certainly by me and many others - until it got to September/October when it came to our attention. Cathy and Pam must quietly worked away in the background laying the foundation for our weekend packing in October.



So we intend to keep this project in your minds from the

beginning of the year. We will be collecting goods throughout the year starting this month. If you are having a post-Christmas sort out - or a Spring clean - please bear this cause in mind. We aim to pack at least 100 shoeboxes- we will need decent sized shoeboxes - these need to be covered with wrapping paper - then filled with goodies and finally sent on their merry way with a £3.00 transport contribution for each shoebox. Cathy Dean has kindly given us all the surplus from this year in very well organised boxes - thank you Cathy.

January - February Flannels, soap, knife, fork, spoon, wooden spoons, DIY hand
tools - screwdrivers, hammers, pliers etc, wrapping paper.

March - April Toothpaste, toothbrush, shower gel, reading spectacles, warm
winter hats. (All sizes please).

We are new to this and are hoping this will be good way of keeping check of what we have and what we still need. Obviously please bring items in as you find/buy them.

Items we plan to pack and would be very grateful for are:- Warm winter hats, scarves and gloves for children & Adults, flannels, soap, shower gel 250ml please, reading spectacles, individual cutlery sets, mugs, wooden spoons. Sewing accessories- needles, threads, buttons etc. Small toys and small soft toys - playing cards, dominos, chess sets. Later on sweets, chocolates - bags of boiled sweets, Colouring pens/pencils - paper, pencil sharpeners and erasers, small colouring books. Candles and candle holders, thin ladies scarves, Hair brush and combs and hair accessories. Small hot water bottles, wind up torches and radio's. Lots to think about! Also contributions to the transport costs please. If you are unsure what to buy then please feel free to make a contribution of cash and we will buy what we need on your behalf. I think that's enough to be going on with! Please look for an update in the next edition.



# Finance Update

I am in the process of finalising the accounts for the year to 31 December 2021 and thought that it would be appropriate to give you all a brief update, based on the draft accounts - before they have been reviewed by our auditor. Even though our activities continued to be limited by Covid restrictions, 2021 was a far more positive year compared with 2020. We are showing a small surplus of £6,000, but this is due mainly to an interim insurance claim pay out, in respect of lost revenue in 2020, of £7,000. In addition, the income from letting our Church and Halls following the relaxation of Covid restrictions gave our accounts a boost.

This meant that at the year-end we held the healthy sum of £46,000 in our various bank accounts. At the same date our investments were valued at £158,000.

I am pleased to report that the generosity of Church members has continued through the year with our donations to other charities. In the past four months we have supported the Shoe Box appeal (£173), Leprosy Mission (£91), Nightwatch (£146), The Children's Trust (£59) and St Christopher's Hospice (£215). Our total giving to charities for the year was £1,393.

## Caring for the Homeless in Croydon

Although we have not been able to operate the Floating Shelter in Croydon - St Paul's has played its part in displaying 'Love in Action' together with many other churches in Croydon we have supplied 80+ sandwiches to NightWatch each night for the last 2 years - each Saturday night I have delivered the sandwiches to The

Quacker meeting house - where there has been a dedicated team from NightWatch busy making soup and sorting out contributions for distribution. We have also supplied a meal and dessert for 5-7 people for the Safe Place to Stay Hub each Friday evening from January to mid February. Their site in the grounds of Croydon University Hospital is due to close shortly - another site with accommodation for up to 15 homeless people in Croydon has been secured. This site has single room accommodation with cooking facilities for each person.




