#### What stands out to you in our scripture reading?

# Jesus healing, praying and a preaching tour in Galilee Mark 1: 29-39

<sup>29</sup> As soon as they left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. <sup>30</sup>Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. <sup>31</sup>He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them.

<sup>32</sup> That evening, at sunset, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. <sup>33</sup>And the whole city was gathered around the door. <sup>34</sup>And he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him.

<sup>35</sup> In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. <sup>36</sup>And Simon and his companions hunted for him. <sup>37</sup>When they found him, they said to him, 'Everyone is searching for you.' <sup>38</sup>He answered, 'Let us go on to the neighbouring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do.' <sup>39</sup>And he went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons.

## 'A Deserted Place'

Very often as we read or listen to a passage of scripture, one part, or verse, or character will stand out and stick in our minds.

You can ask yourself that question as you start reading – 'what stands out to me'?

This is very often how I begin to write a sermon – something will stick in my mind as I read and reflect on the passage. The Spirit sparks a direction to explore, which will speak to us.

In our reading from Mark, it is vs.35 that has stayed with me. <sup>35</sup> In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed.

Whenever I approach Mark's gospel, Ched Myers commentary 'Binding the strong man', is never far from my side. He notices that throughout Mark, Jesus struggles between the public and private, moments of busy activity and snatched time-out and prayer: engagement and withdrawal.

We can see this at work today.

Just prior to our reading, Jesus was in the synagogue throwing out an unclean spirit, gaining fame which spread throughout Galilee.

As soon as they left the synagogue, Jesus escapes this celebrity in the home of Simon and Andrew.

Even there, he can't escape his ministry, as Simon's mother-in-law was ill with a fever – and without a thought, he breaks his withdrawal and heals her.

Jesus then faces a very full-on evening, with 'all who were sick or possessed with demons' brought to him and the whole city was gathered there.

We can imagine him falling into bed late at night, drained of energy. Early in the morning, when it was still dark, he rose and went out to a deserted-place to pray.

This private withdrawal is, again, shattered – as Simon and other companions hunt him down: *'everyone is searching for you'*.

He doesn't tell them to 'go away', as any of us might be tempted to – he replies 'let us go on to the neighbouring towns so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came to do'.

Those snatched moments to re-energize and charge batteries feel really important. Jesus clearly knew he needed them, if he was to keep up with the pace of his mission in Capernaum – especially as his fame spread.

His public role was constantly exerting pressure on his private needs.

Can you see something of this in your own life? Moments when your desire or need to escape to a deserted-place, comes under pressure for all kinds of expectations?

Not that these expectations are necessary bad – as family, work, friends can all demand our time and energy – but they can still feel like a burden; even a joyful one!

Our modern world makes all kinds of demands on us, placing all manner of expectations that we feel we need to meet.

Some of us, but certainly our young people, will feel the pressure to have the perfect and always-amazing life that social media demands – liking the right things, looking a certain way in photos, travelling the world...

These strange and challenging times of the pandemic, demand much more of us, I think.

The idea of escaping to a deserted-place feels bizarre, given that we are in lockdown, unable to see our friends and family face to face. Isn't this already a deserted-place?

Even in our much-constricted lives at the moment, the pressures and demands are still there – perhaps with even greater weight.

Home schooling Caring for elderly relatives Balancing pressured finances Trying to follow restrictions and do the right thing Should I clap for Captain Sir Tom or the NHS? Am I exercising enough with Joe Wicks? Have I sorted my house from top to bottom? Have I learnt a new language, with all this free time? Working longer hours either at home or out in the hospital, cleaning the streets etc...

The public demands and pressure feel greater.

What might it mean for us to follow the way of Jesus? Where is our deserted-place, where we can pray?

Do we need to hear that these places and times of withdrawal are not selfish? I hope we know that God is always with us – even in the demands and busyness, but perhaps Jesus, like us, struggled to hear God or to fully immerse himself in God's peace whilst in the fray.

Jesus repeatedly sought space to be with the one who gave him life.

Where is that space for you?

Let us all seek to follow Jesus, not only into activity and action, but also to those re-energizing spaces of prayer; those deserted-places where the Holy Spirit will fill us again, with hope and joy. Amen

Make us generous in our responses and prevent us from having a small world view.

We pray for ourselves at St Paul's and South Croydon United. Creator God make us a people of light and love ever adapting to our situations, ever finding new ways to reach out to our communities to spread your message of hope. Give us the courage to step out on new paths, trusting in your guidance and listening to the Spirit.

Merciful God, if we do not hear at first, we pray that you will speak even louder. We pray that we will learn to rest in you and to recharge our flagging spirits with your inextinguishable energy.

Here is the story of this meal:

#### The Story

On the night on which he was betrayed, And as they were sitting at a meal, Jesus took a piece of bread and broke it. He gave it to his disciples saying, 'This is my body. It is broken for you. Do this to remember me'.

Later, after they had eaten, He took a cup of wine and said, 'This cup is the new relationship with God Made possible because of my death. Drink this all of you, to remember me.'

So, now we do as Jesus did We take simple bread and wine, And fill them with meaning. Christ seeks to make us whole. The table is ready and so in joy, we pray together:

#### The Great Prayer

Life-giving God, source of all love, Your energy and creative spirit fill the earth! Through you we dare to hope For a feast in which all people will join, With you we dare to search For a new song to be sung by the whole earth, In you we dare to dream Of the liberation which Christ has promised.

We rejoice in the new life that is ours through you; of which, this meal is a visible symbol. Therefore, with all your people in heaven and on earth, we praise you, saying the hymn of your everlasting glory: HOLY, HOLY, HOLY LORD GOD OF POWER AND MIGHT HEAVEN AND EARTH ARE FULL OF YOUR GLORY HOSANNA IN THE HIGHEST. BLESSED IS THE ONE WHO COMES IN THE NAME OF THE LORD. HOSANNA IN THE HIGHEST!

Risen Jesus, It is not by our goodness that we are here, but by your gracious invitation with arms outstretched in welcome.

It is not to continue an ancient tradition but to be nourished by our living Lord.

It is not to escape the demands of the world but to be inspired again, by the life of Christ.

Spirit God, bless this meal, this simple bread and wine, that it might renew and strengthen us, with both the power and gentleness of your spirit. AMEN
